2017 INTERFAITH HOLOCAUST COMMEMORATION: "STRANGE HAVEN: FLEE-ING THE HOLOCAUST TO SHANGHAI"

In 1938, 6-year-old Sigmund Tobias and his family fled from their home in Berlin, Germany, to Japanese-ruled Hongkew, one of the poorest parts of Shanghai, China, where they lived as refugees along with 17,000 other European Jews for more than 10 years.

Tobias will share his story as he addresses the topic "Strange Haven: Fleeing the Holocaust to Shanghai" as the featured speaker for the Tulsa Council for Holocaust Education's 20th Annual Yom HaShoah/Interfaith Holocaust Commemoration on Thursday, April 20 at 7 p.m. at Congregation B'nai Emunah, 1719 S. Owasso Ave. The public is invited to the free presentation, which is recommended for ages 12 and older.

Parking is limited at B'nai Emunah. Arrive early to ensure parking availability. Carpooling is encouraged.

After the commemoration, Tobias will sign copies of his memoir "Strange Haven: A Jewish Childhood in Wartime Shanghai," which chronicles his family's journey as refugees. Copies



> Tulsa Council for Holocaust Education (a committee of the Jewish Federation of Tulsa) and the Tulsa City-County Library, in cooperation with dozens of local interfaith and community organizations.

> As in past years, the commemoration program includes an exhibit of artwork created by Tulsa area students of the Holocaust. In addition, there will be a candle lighting in memory of those who were murdered in the Holocaust. Plus, the Tulsa City-County Library will have available for checkout many Holocaust books and media.

To complement the commemoration, the Circle Cinema, 10 S. Lewis, will show "Shanghai Ghetto" on Sunday, April 2 at 2 p.m. Narrated by Academy Award winner Martin Landau, this powerful documentary features interviews of survivors and historians, rare letters, stock footage, still photos and footage shot in modern Shanghai where most of the Jewish Ghetto remains unchanged. Take the kids to learn about one of America's most beloved folk singers at the Woody Guthrie Center's newest exhibit How Can I Keep From Singing: The Work of Pete Seeger, opening this month.

The exhibit, which follows Seeger's life from his music to his work as a social activist, opens with a members-only event on April 5, featuring a performance and discussion with banjo player Tony Trischka. The public opening is April 6 and continues through Aug. 21.

"We are thrilled to be bringing Pete's message of peace, justice, and equality to Woody's home in Tulsa," said Woody Guthrie Center Executive Director Deana Mc-Cloud. "Their common message is one that remains relevant as we continue their work for positive social change in the world."

Among the artifacts to be featured in the co-curated exhibit are original lyrics; items from Seeger's work with the Almanac Singers, The Weavers and People's Songs; his writings about Woody Guthrie; documents connected to the blacklisting era of the House Un-American Activities Committee; tools and clothing from Seeger's cabin; examples of his environmental work; and interactive experiences such as a sing-along area with some of the songs Seeger famously recorded as well as an interactive banjo lesson.
