ACLU of Oklahoma hires director of investigative communications

M. Scott Carter, an award-winning investigative reporter, has joined the staff of the American Civil Liberties Union of Oklahoma, Executive Director Ryan Kiesel said.

Carter will serve as the ACLU of Oklahoma's director of investigative communications, a new position at the ACLU of Oklahoma that will support its work in courthouses and the state Capitol.

"Scott Carter is a gifted journalist and has a deep understanding of Oklahoma government, law and history and an insatiable determination to find the truth," Kiesel said. "I am confident his work

Carter, a native Oklahoman, was Capitol Bureau Chief for The Journal Record news-

In 2013, he was named one of the state's top three political reporters by The Washington Post's blog, "The Fix." Carter is a four-time winner of the Associated Press-Oklahoma News Editors Sweepstakes Award for public affairs and investigative reporting.

Draper has written more than 30 books for children and teens and has taught for more than 25 years in Cincinnati

Public Schools as a language arts teacher. She was selected as Ohio's Outstanding High School Language Arts Educator, Ohio Teacher of the Year and National Teacher of the Year in 1997.

Draper's most awarded book, "Out of My Mind," was published in 2010 and was at the top of the New York Times' bestseller list for nine weeks. Fifth-grade student Melody struggles to overcome the physical limitations from cerebral palsy and communicate her insightful

Draper will accept the award at at 7 p.m. Aug. 28 at Hardesty Regional Library's Connor's Cove.

She also will present awards to winners of the 2015 Young People's Creative Writing Contest awards at the ceremony to culminates the 2015 children's and teen summer reading programs at the Tulsa City-County Library.


