Addressing a "full house" of children and parents, Mayer's Broadway voice and enthusiasm for presentation kept his audience awed. Mayer, who grew up with his brother on the stage in their father's Las Vegas act, said crowds are not threatening to him. "I feel more comfortable in a situation like this than I do at home," he said. Having already studied business and marketing, he's realizing that education is his real niche. "I love teaching," he said, and plans to go back to school to study education.

Mayer shared with the children that all the things they've seen at the children's museum are gone, and all new exhibits have taken their place, including a section on spheres — bubbles — and a life-sized foosball game. Each child received an admission pass for one in their library goody bag.

They also received the good advice that nothing is impossible; it just hasn't been figured out yet.
