Explore the colorful cultures of Cambodia, China, India, Indonesia, Japan, Korea, Taiwan, Vietnam and other countries in Asia. Admission to the festival is free.

The festival kicks off at 10:45 a.m. with a traditional Chinese dragon dance performed by Luohan Wushu Kungfu Center. The festival also features martial arts demonstrations and an interactive tai chi presentation; Kamishibai storytelling; traditional Japanese drumming performance and tea ceremony; traditional Indonesian, Korean and Indian dances; authentic arts and crafts booths; kite-flying demonstrations; interactive educational booths featuring hands-on crafts and activities for kids; cosplay and traditional dress contests; plus a food concession with traditional Asian cuisine provided by India Palace and Lone Wolf Banh Mi (Vietnamese).

Participating groups include Thomas Academy of Taiji Kung Fu; Di Dim Dol; Happy Seniors Asian American Association; Lilik and Company World Fusion Dance Ensemble; Indian Association of Greater Tulsa; Ohitsuji Taiko; Wolfe Pack Taekwondo; Beihai, China Sister City; Catholic Charities of Tulsa; East Asian Institute/Confucius Institute, University of Oklahoma-Tulsa; Indonesian Club; Tokyo in Tulsa; Tulsa Japanese Friendship Club; Tulsa Language and Culture Bank; Utsunomiya, Japan Sister City; Kaohsiung, Taiwan Sister City; and YWCA Multicultural Service Center.
