Library has two Summer Reading Programs

Most of you know about the Summer Reading Program for children at the library, but did you know we also have

This year the theme is "Migrations." I encourage you to participate in the Adult Summer Reading Program by read-

ing this year's pick for the library's One Book, One Tulsa program, The Warmth of Other Suns: The Epic Story of America's Great Migration by Isabel Wilkerson.

In the book, Pulitzer Prize-winning author Wilkerson tells the story of the migration of black citizens who fled the South for northern and western cities in search of a better life. The migration of almost six million people from 1915-70 changed the face of America.

In her review of the book, Adult Services Librarian Cindy Hulsey says:

"Wilkerson uses lyrical language to paint a captivating picture of three individuals who made this arduous journev: all to different destinations during different decades. Wilkerson relates Ayana Mathis. The book begins in 1923, when 15-year-old Hattie Shepherd flees Georgia and settles in Philadelphia,

hoping for a chance at a better life.

Instead, she marries a man who will bring her nothing but disappointment and becomes a mother to 11 children. After a heartbreaking loss, she is determined to raise children who are prepared to face a difficult and cruel world.

The story is told in twelve narrative threads, from the

perspectives of Hattie and her children. Their lives tell the tale of a mother's monumental courage and the journey of a nation. I found this book impossible to put down and unforgettable. This is one of those books you remember for years after reading.
