Barnes being a second mom to McQuade, the youth librarian says she will miss seeing her every day.

As with any job, working for a library has its ups and downs.

"My greatest challenge

has been the need to understand technology to help customers on the computers and their ereader devices," Barnes said.

This down definitely overshadows her greatest reward from working with the library.

"When I first came down here there was a man who didn't speak English very well, but he wanted to. He came all the time and checked out all the books and tapes we had. He worked really hard and then started bringing his daughter. It was so rewarding to see him learn to speak English and bring his daughter to the library so she could have the same experience he did," she said.
