The New Year has begun and it's time to begin working on those New Year resolutions – eating right, exercising and getting a Tulsa City County Library card. How can a library card help you and your family? Let me give you the lowdown on all the possibilities with your library card.

A Tulsa City County Library card allows you to check-out a variety of materials in multiple formats including children, tweens, teens and adults. Choose from large print, audiobooks, eBooks, DVDs and BluRays. Your library card also allows you to download digital magazines and newspapers, stream movies and download music. Online databases are available through the library such as JobNow! This database gives free

online job assistance from your home, including expert resume help, interview coaching, GED test preparation and career assistance. Homework Help Now! connects K-12 students and others to a live tutor for help with their homework. This service is available seven days a week between the hours of 2 and 11 p.m. Writing help and skills building are also offered. Mango is an online language program that can help you learn

by listening to native speakers and engaging in the interactive lessons offered through this user-friendly language instruction tool. Many other databases are also available for your information needs. The Tulsa City County Library system has 24 branches across Tulsa County. We offer Wi-Fi, computers, printers, fax service, business databases and more. The Jenks Library branch is located at 523 W. B St.

To get a library card fill out an application available at any Tulsa City County Library location. Adults are required to provide photo identification and verify current residential address. Minors (17 and younger) may receive a card signed for by the parent or legal guardian. Additionally, you may apply for a card online.
