One of many ways we can judge the value of a community's library system is to look at its foot traffic, circulation of materials and overall use of programs and services, among other metrics.

In Tulsa County, that means more than 5 million physical and virtual visitors annually, total circulation well past 7 million items per year and well over 300,000 individuals attending programs this past year. That's a lot of children learning to read, adults starting businesses or finding jobs, people completing their high school diploma and so much more. aforementioned numbers mean TCCL routinely sees public use outpacing the size and functionality of our branch locations.

That's why over two years ago we ambitiously set out on a capital campaign, called MY Library, OUR Future, to raise \$58 million for four branches in desperate need of growth and modern offerings – two in Tulsa, one in Owasso and one in Broken Arrow. Today, we have secured funding for the two Tulsa locations – the new Bronson Brookside Library at 4607 S. Madison Place and the new Rudisill Regional Library at 1017 N. Greenwood Ave. – and officially broke ground on each location in June, with grand openings projected for 2025 for the Bronson Brookside Library and 2026 for Rudisill.

Each groundbreaking marked a significant milestone and the keeping of a promise that TCCL made to the citizens of Tulsa County, and that is to provide resources that inspire curiosity and creativity and offer opportunities for lifelong learning, and to build and sustain a library system for future generations.

Through MY Library, OUR Future, tomorrow's TCCL will continue to inspire, promote learning and create connections that strengthen our communities, and expand our reach and improve our usability by revamping traditional services, removing barriers to service and adding new, more convenient ways to use the library.

As you turn the pages of this annual report, you will see how MY library is OUR future as you take a look back at significant milestones and achievements over the past year that show how TCCL continues to meet the ever-changing needs of society and, of course, our local communities.

Friends of the Helmerich Library

The purpose of this organization is to aid and promote the activities and goals of the Peggy V. Helmerich Library. This dedicated group hosts an ongoing book sale throughout the year, as well as a bigger annual book sale each April. The group raised \$19,631 from the 2024 annual book sale, which was the highest amount they have ever made. The sale took place over two weekends. Since its inception in 2004, the Friends of the Helmerich Library has given more than \$140,000 to fund programming for all Tulsa City-County Library locations.

Friends of the Rudisill Regional Library

This group supports the Rudisill Regional Library and the African American Resource Center by raising funds, volunteering at library programs, encouraging new customers to use the library, hosting book discussions and supporting TCCL staff in continuing education with the Freddie Martin Rudisill Scholarship Award.

Happy birthday, Dolly!


On Jan. 19, Tulsa County celebrated the

The Imagination Library is paid for through a partnership with the Oklahoma State Department of Education and private funding through the Birth through Eight Strategy for Tulsa, an initiative of the George Kaiser Family Foundation.

Retired astronaut receives Circle of Honor Award

The American Indian Resource Center honored retired astronaut and Navy Cmdr. John B. Herrington, Chickasaw, with the American Indian Festival of Words Circle of Honor Award on March 2 at Central Library (pictured above). Herrington was the first enrolled citizen of a federally recognized tribe to go into space. About 465 people attended the day's events. The Tulsa Air and Space Museum kicked off the festivities with a fun family presentation in the Children's Department and Magic City Books sold copies of Herrington's children's book Mission to Space. At the award ceremony, the Chickasaw Nation Honor Guard posted the colors. The Kaw Nation, Osage Nation, Sac and Fox Honor Guard and Tulsa Indian Club princesses beautifully signed "The Lord's Prayer." Homage was paid to the American Indian Resource Center as it celebrated 20 years of service to the Native community. Pawnee Public School's Pawnee Language Class sang their rendition of "Major Tom" in the Pawnee language. To top it off, Herrington and his wife, Debra, donated his \$10,000 honorarium back to the American Indian Resource Center! These funds will go toward more cultural and language programs. The Circle of Honor Award is sponsored by the Maxine & Jack Zarrow Family Foundation and the Tulsa Library Trust.

Volunteers save TCCL over \$450,000

TCCL honored 42 volunteers for years or hours of service at the 50th Annual Volunteer Appreciation Celebration on April 21. The Friends of the Tulsa City-County Libraries hosted the reception and the Tulsa Library Trust provided the volunteer gifts. In 2023, 453 volunteers (84.5% growth from the previous year) collectively donated 14,155 hours (322.8% increase from the prior year) at their local libraries, saving TCCL \$450,129, according to the Independent Sector of Washington, D.C., which calculates volunteer time at \$31.80 per hour in Oklahoma.

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Solar eclipse creates communal experience

People of all ages flocked to Broken Arrow, Central and South Broken Arrow libraries to view the near-total eclipse of the sun on April 8. Nearly 350 showed up for South Broken Arrow's "Solar Eclipse of the Heart" event. After running out of free solar eclipse glasses, staff helped customers make their own viewers. At the Broken Arrow branch, nearly 600 watched the eclipse from the front lawn, while many shared glasses after the library ran out. And at Central Library, 400 gathered in the A.R. and Marylouise Tandy Foundation Children's Garden for the communal viewing. All TCCL branches had free solar eclipse glasses available for the community. Providing students with a positive learning experience

Each school year, the free After-School Homework Club provides an opportunity for learners in grades three through eight to focus more deeply on homework assignments and dig deeper into areas where they are struggling. Registered students are assigned a homework coach to work with them weekly for up to 30 minutes. For the 2023-2024 school year, TCCL's After-School Homework Club facilitated 639 individual homework sessions to 84 registered students. Students from Bixby, Broken Arrow, Jenks, Sand Springs, Tulsa and Union public school districts participated in the free program offered at five TCCL branches Sept. 18, 2023-April 25, 2024. The 2024-2025 school year kicked off Sept. 16 with seven TCCL branches offering the club.

Literacy – Art – Community

TCCL's second annual VERSES fundraiser featured an eclectic makers market with



over 30 vendors and a community festival with over 20 poetry readings and musical performances (pictured above). More than 200 people attended the three-hour event on Sept. 28 at Central Library,

Reyna Grande shares inspirational message

The 2024 Hummingbird Award in Literary Arts, given by TCCL's Hispanic Resource Center and the Tulsa Library Trust, was a resounding success, drawing in over 70 attendees for a memorable event on Oct. 19 at Martin Regional Library. Award recipient Reyna Grande (pictured above in center) spoke powerfully about the importance of channeling trauma into creative expression and the necessity of taking ownership of our Latinx voices and stories. During her visit to Tulsa, TCCL also engaged over 300 students from San Miguel Middle School and Tulsa School of Arts and Sciences, bringing Grande's inspirational message to younger audiences in the community. Her visit was a profound reminder of the powe of storytelling and its role in affirming diverse voices and was a great way to mark the Hispanic Resource Center's 25th anniversary by making the event a meaningful celebration of resilience, heritage and community.

Books To Treasure celebrates the beauty and power of children's literature

Award-winning children's book author and illustrator Sophie Blackall shined brightly as the featured presenter for TCCL's 2024 Books To Treasure program, held Nov. 8 at Hardesty Regional Library (pictured above). About 350 people of all ages gathered in Connor's Cove for the free presentation by the beloved writer and illustrator of such works as Finding Winnie, illustrated by Blackall (and for which Blackall won her first Caldecott Medal) and written by Lindsay Mattick, and Hello Lighthouse, which won Blackall her second Caldecott. Blackall shared her childhood artwork, her current artistic inspirations and her life story, from growing up in Australia to making her home in the United States. As part of her visit to Tulsa. Blackall visited several schools to talk with second graders about her work. Sponsored by the Tulsa Library Trust through a grant from The Anne & Henry Zarrow Foundation, Books To Treasure has grown into a Tulsa tradition for all second grade students in Tulsa County. As a part of the annual program, every second grader receives a free copy of the featured illustrator's book. This year, nearly 11,000 copies of *If You* Come to Earth, written and illustrated by Blackall, were given out. Plus, thousands of second graders received a custom TCCL library card featuring an illustration from the featured book.

History extraordinaire receives Helmerich Award

"One of my earliest thrills as a child was when my mother would take me and my siblings to the local library. We would go every Saturday and load up on books," said acclaimed historian and University of Texas at Austin professor H. W. Brands in an interview for the Tulsa World to promote the 2024 Peggy V. Helmerich Distinguished Author Award. Since 1988, the prolific author and two-time Pulitzer Prize finalist has written more than 30 books on U.S. history, economics and foreign affairs, including his most recent title, America First, released in September 2024. Brands received the prestigious Helmerich Award at an elegant black-tie gala held amongst the bookshelves at Central Library on Dec. 6 (pictured above). Earlier that same day, Brands spoke to nearly 100 high schoolers from Will Rogers High School and the Tulsa School of Arts and Sciences at a special student presentation at the library. On the previous evening, the *New York Times* bestselling author engaged and enlightened scores of readers who came to Central Library to get their books signed and enjoy a free Q&A, moderated by Oklahoma State Rep. John Waldron. Given annually since 1985 by Tulsa City-County Library and the Tulsa Library Trust, the Helmerich Award consists of a \$40,000 cash prize and an engraved crystal book.




TCCL history book named finalist in design in Oklahoma Book Awards
